Saturday 21 February

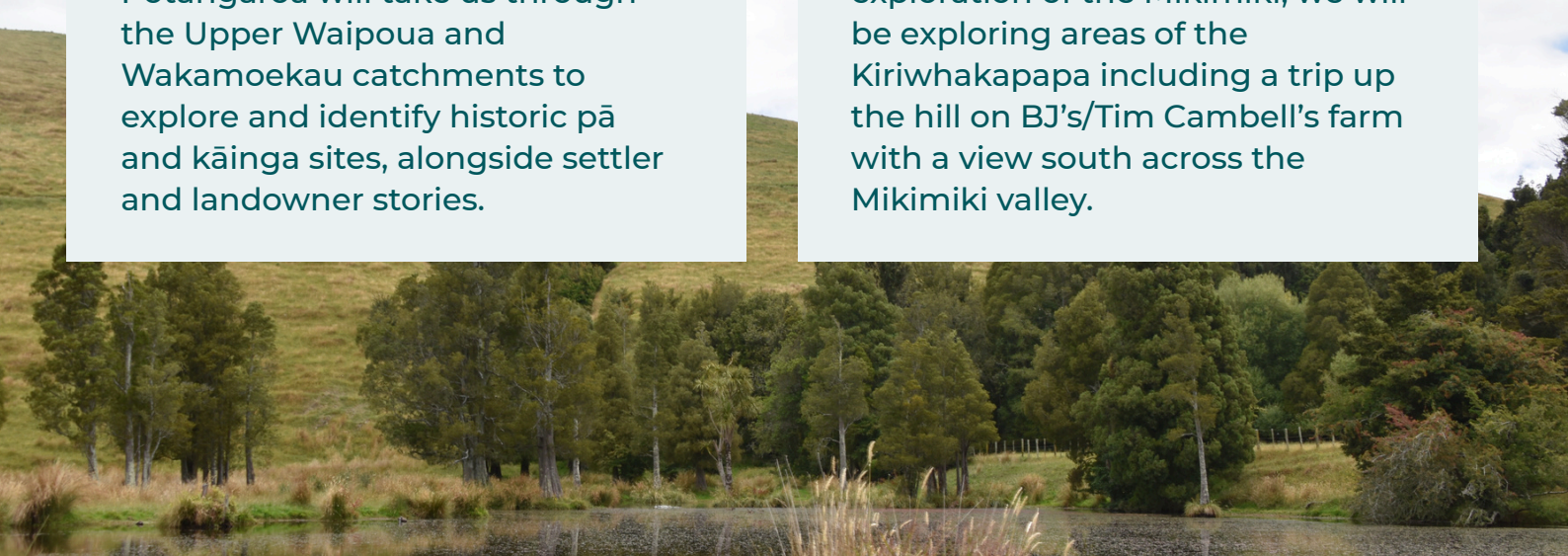

Wairarapa Catchment Collective are hosting a sites of significance hīkoi with the Upper Waipoua and Wakamoekau Catchment Groups, led by Joseph Potangaroa, of Potangaroa Education.

The overall theme of the hīkoi will be to identify a number of the twenty or more pā and kāinga. From Tawera, south along State Highway 2, west along Loopline, south along Paierau Road and finishing at Thistle Avenue, before returning to Mount Bruce Hall. Joe is also interested in settler and landowner stories as we go.

Tawera is the mountain opposite to Mt Bruce at Kotukutuku at the top of the Ruamāhanga Valley above where the Ruamāhanga River enters the valley from the Tararua Mountains. A term for the top or head of a valley is Te Kauru.

Managing Pest Weeds and Trees

Regrettably our catchment has a number of significant and spreading pest plants and trees. These include pasture weeds and spreading domestic plants.

We are excited to be launching our pest plant pocket guide in the New Year, showing identification and means of control, with a free copy for each household in the catchment and for the enviro school pupils at Ōpaki school.

In conjunction with the release, we will be offering three hands on workshops on how to manage our current list of pest plants. Details TBC.
